Illinois Air National Guard helps move critical disaster relief supplies after Hurricane Matthew

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. -- Five airmen with the 183d Air Mobility Operations Squadron returned to Springfield after wrapping up nearly two weeks of humanitarian assistance operations supporting Hurricane Matthew relief efforts in Haiti.

The Illinois Air National Guard members planned and executed missions from the 612th Air and Space Operations Center at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Ariz. The sophisticated 24-hour center is responsible for U.S. Air Force operations within U.S. Southern Command (SOUTHCOM).

At the request of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), SOUTHCOM established a joint task force at Port-au-Prince to move food, water, shelter materials and medical supplies into the region.

“It was a team effort by everyone involved,” said Air Control Team member Senior Master Sgt. Erik Lane. “We coordinated support for air assets from the Navy and the Air Force, as well as multiple command and control centers across the military to get personnel and supplies to Port-au-Prince International Airport.”

The team obtained air clearances, conducted flight and load plan validation, planned for aeromedical evacuation scenarios, and numerous other elements that are necessary to move military aircraft.

“It’s always amazing to see the coordination and synchronization required to make an operation such as this work successfully. The movement of over 250 metric tons of materials and more than 400 personnel into and out of such a constrained airfield, in such an expedited

manner exemplifies the unique ability of our military,” said Lt. Col. Jason Klaas, Deputy Chief of the Air Mobility Division.

This wasn’t the first time the squadron has responded to the call for humanitarian assistance. Airmen were also involved in Operation Unified Response which provided relief in the aftermath of the devastating earthquake that shook Haiti in 2010.

The commander of the squadron, Col. Jim Silvasy, monitored operations from home base at



Springfield Capital Airport. “I’m proud of what our folks accomplished. We have a remarkable capability in the DOD to push critical, life-saving materials into an area within hours of a request. These airmen were part of that life-saving effort.”

The 612th Air and Space Operations Center is the primary command and control facility for coalition air operations in the Caribbean, as well as Central and South America. The 183rd Air Mobility Operations Squadron trains for command and control missions with SOUTHCOM and military air operations centers around the world.

Just One Block

A recent message from Illinois National Guard Headquarters was sent to all personnel looking for “quilting-type folks” who would be interested in submitting a quilt square representing the State of Illinois. The original request came from the Chief of Staff, Air National Guard Readiness Center (ANGRC), soliciting support for submission of a quilt block to be used in

creating the Quilt of 54. Each state, territory, and district, would submit a quilt block that measured 28 inches square; a 24 inch block with a two inch border. All submissions would then be assembled into the Quilt of 54, for display at ANGRC.



The quilt when finished will measure an astonishing 14 by 21 feet!

After asking a few questions concerning specifics of what the request entailed, and some convincing on whether or not she should take this up in the last month of her career, Senior Master Sgt. Wendy Ratterree stepped up to the challenge.

“I received encouragement from all across base from folks who know I have a passion for quilting. I couldn’t let Illinois go unrepresented,” said Ratterree. She immediately went to work on a design, a design that would include the crests of all three Illinois’ Air National Guard wings, as well as the State Seal of Illinois, and color choices that represent the state and the ANG mission.

The block design begins with the traditional Illinois quilt block. The block is repeated four times, once for each organization established within the state, the sum of which is the Illinois Air National Guard. The organizational emblems in the center of each block portray the distinctive history, mission, and general function of each organization. The order of the unit emblems represents the respective location of each within the state. The Great Seal of Illinois is depicted in the center of the block. The state flag consists of the central elements of the seal on a white background, with the word “Illinois” printed below. This represents that in addition to serving country, the citizen soldier serves their state to provide protection of life and property, and preservation of peace, order and public safety.

The color choices. Mottled brown fabric represents the fertile soil found beneath the prairie grasslands that once blanketed Illinois. This fertile soil is thought to be the greatest natural resource of the state as nearly 75% of the state’s total land area is farmland. This in turn represents the solid foundation were the citizen soldier can establish deep roots.

Beige fabric represents the abundant harvests reaped from the fertile soil found across

Thermal Injury Prevention Program Change

On 7 April 2016, the Secretary of the Air Force converted AFPAM 48-151 into AFI 48-151. According to the AFI 48-151, “this AFI has been significantly revised incorporating major changes, to include conversion from a non-directive AFPAM to an AFI, creation of Air Force TIPPAs, new roles and responsibilities, and Tiering requirements.”

Air Force TIPPAs or Thermal Injury Prevention Programs, are mainly concerned with heat injury. According to the AFI, heat injury is a high priority for Basic Military Training, and in the preparation and training of Battlefield Airman and Security Forces. A strategic and comprehensive set of heat injury prevention countermeasures will be developed by Training Wing Safety and Preventive Medicine Physicians. Thermal injury risk may be approximated by an assessment of environmental conditions, but this AFI recommends environmental monitoring techniques by using Wet Bulb Globe Temperature (WBGT) and Frostbite Risk Level (FRL). In this AFI, there has been a modification to the WBGT for clothing. There is no adjustment for normal duty-type uniforms, but for a second layer of clothing (chemical protective gear or firefighting gear). This second layer will add to the WBGT measurement as follows +6°C/+10°F and +12°C/+20°F for moderate / heavy work. This in turn will affect the work/rest cycle and water intake (Qt/hr).

Chapter 2 of the AFI contains the roles and responsibilities for the Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Installation, Environment and Energy, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Environment, Safety and Infrastructure, Air Force Surgeon General, Air Force Medical Support Agency, Aerospace Medicine Policy and Operations Division, USAFSAM Occupational and Environmental Health, Major Command Surgeon, Installation Commander, Installation Environment, Safety and Occupational Health Council, Military Treatment Facility Commander, Chief of Aerospace Medicine, Weather Flight commander, Bioenvironmental

Engineering Flight Commander, Public Health Flight Commander, Geographically Separated Unit Commander or Delegate, Aerospace and Operational Physiology, Base Civil Engineer, Unit/Organizational Commander, Workplace Supervisor and Employee. If you are listed above and have not already, please take a look at the new AFI 48-151.

The tiering requirement is for when submitting waiver requests through the chain of command. To know what level of authority has the right to waive, one must look at the end of the requirement for a “T-0, T-1, T-2 or T-3.” Then look in AFI 33-360 Table 1.1 for who has the authority to waive amongst a few other matter.

the state. Although most widely known for corn and soybeans, Illinois is also leading producer of pumpkins and horseradish, as well as many other agricultural products. It is said that each farmer feeds 156 people. This represents a desire to provide comfort and care to the community.

White border fabric represents the white field of the Illinois state flag which in turn represents service to state.

Ratterree also had the idea to create a second duplicate block and finish it as a mini quilt that will reside within the State.

The quilt block submission was required to have a written description of what the quilt block represents, for a book to accompany the Quilt of 54. That description reads as follows:

Illinois

- The Prairie State -

- The Land of Lincoln -

The 21st state to enter the Union on December 3, 1818.

Named after the Illinois River, which was named after the native people found living in the region in 1679.

Illinois Air National Guard

Headquartered at Camp Lincoln, Springfield.

126th Air Refueling Wing, established 1 July 1927, stationed at Scott Air Force Base, Belleville.

182d Airlift Wing, established 21 June 1947, stationed at Peoria Air National Guard Base.

183d Fighter Wing, established 30 September 1948, stationed at Capital Airport Air National Guard Station, Springfield.

Quest For Zero and Check 3 GPS

Over the last year, there have been a couple of new Safety campaigns initiated. The annual “Critical Days of Summer” (CDS) has been discontinued and replaced. In FY 2015, the Air Force Safety Center introduced the Quest for Zero campaign. On duty safety and risk management is the primary focus of the campaign. The belief is that a more powerful message to on duty work will carry outside the installation borders to off duty activities. The intent of Quest for Zero is for Airmen to recognize the hazards they face every day, at work and at home.

Safety is a priority in all career fields at all levels, every day. Awareness of the hazards is the first step in mitigation and risk management to preserve our most valuable asset - our Airmen.

Throughout the year, Quest for Zero will highlight one safety topic each month. Every Airman can make a difference in their and the safety of their Wingman. When Airmen embrace the Quest for Zero motto - my job, my life, my choice - they are, in a real way, fulfilling their commitment to mission success. The Safety office will send information out on each

month’s topic. Beginning next month, Oct 2016 (FY2017) the topic is “Communication”.

Another Safety initiative is Check 3 GPS. Check 3 are three simple and quick questions to assess any activity. G: Do you have the right Gear? P: Do you have a good Plan? S: Do you have the right Skills?

Why check three ... and what is GPS? Check 3 is a quick and easy method to assess any activity or event for possible hazards and allow mitigation when required. This method has three general areas to assess, or check, for your activity. This “Check 3” approach is assessing three areas referenced by the common acronym GPS. In this case, GPS is not referencing a navigation aid.

This allows a quick review of your activity to highlight any issues or hazards. For instance, “G” or gear may encompass details such as personal protective equipment, your vehicle, or availability of drinking water. “P” or plan may encompass the timeline, weather, sequence, emergency contact/backup, as well as other facets. “S” or skills may mean are you rested for the activity or your overall experience level with the activity. If you see an issue or hazard in any of the areas, then assess if you can adjust

an area to mitigate the hazard, especially the plan.

This framework allows anyone, regardless of experience or knowledge, to have a quick mental method to begin assessing all their activities. As a person becomes more experienced and knowledgeable in any activity, their “Check 3” will also become more effective. Family Care Plans

It is each member's responsibility to ensure that their military records are up-to-date and accurate. Take some time each month to review a portion of your military records to ensure that your information is current. One small error could make a big difference to your career, benefits, or entitlements.

For November we will be looking at Family Care Plans.

All Air Force members with dependent family members will have family care arrangements that reasonably cover all situations, both short-term and long-term.

It will detail and provide a smooth, rapid transfer of responsibilities to designees during the absence of the member. Contingency operations requiring temporary duty (TDY), along with overseas assignments to family-restricted areas and other duties require members to be separated from their family and require unique family care arrangements. Each Air Force member is responsible for the care of family members during these circumstances.

WHO IS REQUIRED TO HAVE A FAMILY CARE PLAN:

- Single Parents
- Military members married to other military members who have dependents
- Members who provide care for an elderly or disabled family member
- Those whose spouse is absent through job commitments or other reasons
- Other circumstances deemed appropriate

WHAT ARE YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Notify your Commander or First Sergeant if a family care plan is needed
- Ensure all requested documents are completed and returned to Commander or First Sergeant

- AF Form 357 / Special Instructions / Powers of Attorney / etc...
- Certify annually that the information listed is still current

REASONS TO REVISE A FAMILY CARE PLAN:

- Death of a spouse
- Child custody decision
- Extended absence of spouse
- Adoption or birth of a child
- Address or phone number changes
- Caregiver changes
- Divorce

It is your responsibility to keep your family care plan current. If any of the information changes, the family care plan should be updated immediately.

WING INSPECTOR GENERAL

1. Special Duty Summary. Plans, directs, conducts, and manages all Wing Inspector General (IG) programs. Provides policy guidance, procedures, planning, oversight, and direction for implementing the Air Force Inspection System, Complaints Resolution Program, and Fraud, Waste, and Abuse (FWA) Program and the Commanders' Inspection Programs (CCIP) at wing/wing equivalent level. Related DoD Occupational Group: 271200.

2. Duties and Responsibilities:

2.1. Directs, conducts, and leads all Wing IG activities. Operates and manages the Wing Office of the Inspector General, responsible for overall operation, administration, and management of Wing IG inspections, Complaints Resolution, FWA Program, and Commanders' Inspection Program (CCIP).

2.2. Organizes IG activities. Develops, establishes, and controls methods and procedures to implement IG policies and programs. Provides oversight and policy guidance concerning IG programs, plans, requirements, management, education and awareness initiatives.

2.3. Provides IG support. Maintains liaison with MAJCOM/IG and SAF/IG where appropriate to receive, process, refer, and manage Wing Inspection information, resources, assets, and activities to support operation and management of the Air Force's Inspection and Complaints Resolution and FWA Programs. Certifies Wing IG personnel and evaluates IG programs and activities.

3. Special Duty Qualifications:

3.1. Knowledge. Knowledge of Air Force Inspection objectives, leadership and management concepts and their relationship to mission accomplishment is mandatory.

3.2. Education. For entry into this SDI, a Master's degree in management, industrial management, education, psychology, criminal justice, public administration, or business administration with a major in management is desirable.

3.3. Training. For retention of this SDI, completion of the Air Force Basic Inspector and Installation Inspector General Training Course taught by SAF/IGQ is mandatory. Wing Inspectors General assigned to Nuclear Certified Units must also attend the Air Force Nuclear Inspectors Course.

3.4. Experience. Previous IG and command experience at the unit, wing or MAJCOM is highly desired.

3.5. Other. The following are mandatory as indicated:

3.5.1. For entry into this specialty, recommendation by unit commander.

3.5.2. For entry and retention of the SDI:

3.5.2.1. Must meet requirements listed in Chapter 8 of AFI 90-201, The Air Force Inspection System.

3.5.2.2. No Unfavorable Information File, civil convictions (other than minor traffic violations), or open IG investigations.

3.5.2.3. Demonstrated ability to prepare written reports.
